On May 23, 1960 at Symphony Hall in Boston, a joint worship of the Universalist Church of America and the American Unitarian Association concluded the final annual meetings of the two consolidating denominations. “There is a mysterious magic in milestones,” began the sermon preached by the Rev. Donald S. Harrington on the occasion. I think you just might find magic here in Charlotte.

Rev. Harrington reflected, “We stand tonight at such a milestone, one which is partly a new birth, partly a commencement, partly a kind of marriage, which involves also a degree of death, an end of things which have been precious to us and of institutions with which we have been lovingly familiar. It is this which makes this milestone moment a living moment of truth, a time to remember, a season for hope and faith.”

Your GA Program Book has all the details of all the speakers, workshops, worship services and other programs that are planned for this Assembly. Just remember, you can’t do it all so don’t try. Past years’ post-GA Evaluations always list workshops including Opening, the Service of the Living Tradition, the CLF Worship Service and Sunday morning as highlights. Also getting rave reviews year after year are the Plenary Sessions, the Ware Lecture and the Exhibit Hall.

There’s a lot you definitely won’t want to miss this year, beginning with Wednesday night’s Opening Celebration (planned by the 50th Anniversary Task Force) which will feature the premier of a specially commissioned hymn. Immediately following the Opening service there will be a Happy 50th birthday party reception in the Exhibit Hall, so plan to enjoy cake and music and visiting the various booths there. This isn’t going to happen every GA.

Preparing for this 50th Assembly was a special joy for us on the Planning Committee. We hope you will find magic here in Charlotte, that you will encounter the unexpected, celebrate in community and return home with treasured memories, your beribboned GA badge, and much to share with members of your home congregation.

Accessibility Services

Persons with vision, hearing, mobility impairment or other special needs will find information about various kinds of assistance and accessibility at the Accessibility Table in the C Concourse of the Convention Center.

Alcohol

No alcoholic beverages will be served or allowed at any Planning Committee sponsored event. All General Assembly events offering alcoholic beverages must also offer attractive non-alcoholic beverages with equal accessibility and prominence. No alcoholic beverages will be served to anyone under the age of 21. As a community we are committed to GA being a safe environment and all attendees are encouraged to support this goal. The UUA Stewardship and Development staff group's Annual Program Fund booth is located in the C Concourse of the Convention Center. We will be recognizing your exceptional generosity with ribbons celebrating Honor, Merit, Leadership and 10+ year Fair Share congregations. Please stop by so that we can thank you for your congregation's contributions to our Association.

Anti-Racism, Anti-Oppression and Multiculturalism

In 1994 and 1997 the General Assembly passed resolutions calling on the UUA to become an anti-racist, multicultural faith community, calling us on a Journey toward Wholeness. In 1997 the General Assembly committed the UUA to work to remove barriers to persons with disabilities. Guided by our principles and in the spirit of these resolutions, all attendees are asked to be mindful of the ways racism, ableism and oppression impact our community and the larger community that is hosting our gathering. There are numerous opportunities through workshops and other programs to expand your awareness and deepen your understanding as together we strive to be a welcoming, inclusive and affirming community for all.

Banners

Banner carriers for the Banner Parade may register their banners on Wednesday from 4:45 p.m. to 6:45 p.m. in the Hall AB lobby of the Convention Center. If banner carriers plan to attend an In-Gathering prior to the Opening Celebration, they will take the banners with them to the In-Gathering after banner registration and return for parade line up no later than 6:45 p.m. Be sure to wear your name badge. A limited number of banner poles will be on sale in the staging area. Make other arrangements for the security of your purses or other valuables; don't bring them to the staging area. Only the banners of congregations and Associate Member Organizations will be hung after the Opening Plenary to contribute to the ambiance of GA. Related organizations are invited to display their banners in their exhibit hall booth or at their group's meetings. All banners to be hung in the banner display areas must be registered before the parade so they can be part of our banner protection system and must have the required sleeve at the top. The banner registration form will ask for the name of the person who is authorized to pick up the banner. Hung banners may not be collected until Sunday, from 10:15 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. in Room 218-219 of the Convention Center. If you cannot arrange for pick-up at the designated time, please do not leave your banner for hanging.

Chaplains

GA chaplains are available at all times during GA for assistance in a personal emergency or need for pastoral care. General Information

Choir Registration

GA Choir registration will be held during regular GA registration hours (Tues. 2-6 PM and before the first rehearsal, Wed. 12-2:45 PM). Singers may register and pick up their music (for a \$10 music fee) at the choir table in the C Concourse until 2:45 PM on Wednesday. There will be a waiting list kept at the first rehearsal for spaces that may open subsequently.

Collections

Offerings are received at the Service of the Living Tradition and Sunday morning worship. The UUA Board of Trustees will take an offering at a plenary session on Saturday to support the Arizona Immigration Ministry and other racial, immigration, and economic justice work in preparation for Justice GA 2012 and thereafter. Exhibit Hall booths and private events not listed in the Program may ask for donations or sell tickets to events. Any other solicitation or ticketed event must be pre-approved by the Planning Committee and announced in the Program.

Commission on Social Witness, UUA

The CSW's mission is to help UUs put our Principles and Purposes into action. The CSW assists the UUA and its member congregations by facilitating the articulation of suggested Congregational Study/Action Issues (CSAIs) and educating UUs in potential social change inherent in CSAIs. After two years of studying the CSAIs, the CSW prepares and presents to the Assembly draft Statements of Conscience. The CSW also facilitates the process of GA Actions of Immediate Witness.

Cyber Café and People Finder

Check your e-mail in the Cyber Café, Booth #1034 in the Exhibit Hall. Please limit your stay to 15 minutes. The Cyber Café is made possible by the generous sponsorship of Church Mutual Insurance. You are invited to enter your contact information in the People Finder, a database in the Cyber Café that helps you to locate your friends at GA. You may also fill out the online GA feedback form here.

Delegates

After you have picked up your GA name badge, bring your signed credential card to the Delegate Credentialing Station in the C Concourse of the Convention Center to receive your delegate voting card and ribbon. You must have your delegate voting card and ribbon to vote in Plenary. If you lose your credential card, voting card, or ribbon, report to the Delegate Credentialing Station to fill out a replacement affidavit. Alternate delegates must present their name badge and a signed alternate credential card along with either the original delegate's credential card or the name badge, ribbon, and voting card of the original delegate.

Emergencies

All hotels and the Convention Center have personnel who can assist with emergencies. Any emergency in the Convention Center requiring medical, police or fire assistance should be directed to Central Security. The Central Security Office is located in the Convention Center on the corner of College street and Stonewall (directly across from Westin hotel). The House number is 6090. From outside the building call 704-339-6090. It is best to report a medical emergency to Central Security as the security staff will know the best entrance for the responders to enter. A roving police officer and an EMT are onsite at all times during General Assembly. For additional information or in case of non-emergency medical needs, go to the Local Information table in the C Concourse of the Convention Center. Please inform the GA Office of any medical emergencies or accidents immediately.

Events Open to the Public

All participants in General Assembly programmed events must be registered for the conference. This includes program participants, presenters, invited guests, performers, office support staff, relatives, hosts, and dignitaries. This policy is consistent with our principle of equity and avoids arbitrary distinctions. GA registrants receive access to all events listed in this Program. GA name badges are required for admission to all GA programmed events, including evening entertainment, the Exhibit Hall (Wednesday-Saturday), the Opening and Closing Celebrations, and the Ware Lecture. The only GA programmed events that will be open to the public (registration not required) are the Service of the Living Tradition, the Sunday Morning Worship, and, on Sunday only, the Exhibit Hall. Non-registrants must pick up a pass for the Exhibit Hall on Sunday at the Registration Kiosks in the C Concourse of the Convention Center before entering the Hall.

Exhibit Hall

The GA Exhibit Hall, located in Hall B of the Convention Center, features exhibits and sales by UU-related organizations, individual UU artisans, and a variety of other organizations and vendors. Refreshment concessions are available during hours the Exhibit Hall is open (except Wednesday night during the 50th Anniversary Reception).

Expectations of All GA Attendees

Let us remember our UU commitment to the worth and dignity of all people. The Association expects all attendees to conduct themselves in a professional manner with concern and respect for all. The UUA is committed to assure that all participants are safe from abuse and harassment. Any harassment regarding race, color, national origin, religion, age, sex, gender, sexual orientation, or disability will not be tolerated. Sexual harassment includes unsolicited remarks, gestures, or physical contact, requests for sexual favors, repeated sexual advances after an initial turn down, or other verbal or physical

conduct of a sexual nature that creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment. Religious professionals are to follow their codes of conduct to avoid misconduct or harassment. Any General Assembly participant who believes that they are the victim of harassment should contact either a chaplain or the Right Relationship Team.

As a courtesy, please allow persons using wheelchairs and scooters to exit meeting rooms first. Also, please leave elevators free for the use of persons using wheelchairs and scooters and others who have difficulty with stairs.

No materials may be distributed inside the Plenary Hall except official business papers authorized by the Planning Committee.

Meeting Rooms - Capacity and Etiquette

To ensure that you get a seat for your preferred events, we encourage you to arrive early. Due to fire and safety codes, standing room and seating in aisles are prohibited. Meeting rooms are shared spaces. All rooms are set up theater style. Chairs may not be rearranged in Convention Center meeting rooms! The Convention Center has very strict restrictions due to labor regulations and safety codes. Also, we take precautions to make sure our room sets are accessible to all. Accessibility is often lost when there is an unauthorized rearrangement of chairs. You should not attempt to relocate or tamper with audio/visual equipment. Please pick up after yourself and use trash and recycling receptacles.

Message Boards

Go to the message center to leave or pick up messages from other GA attendees. Message boards are located in the Convention Center in the lobby outside of Ballroom B. If calls come to the GA Office for individuals in attendance at GA, notes will be left for them at the Message Center.

Name Badges

All participants in General Assembly programmed events must be registered for the conference. Everyone in attendance must be registered, including program participants, presenters, invited guests, performers, office support staff, relatives, hosts, and dignitaries. This policy is consistent with our principle of equity and avoids arbitrary distinctions. GA registrants receive an official name badge to identify them to fellow participants, ushers, event staff and security. GA name badges are required for admission to all GA programmed events (except the Service of the Living Tradition and the Sunday Morning Worship) including evening entertainment and the Exhibit Hall (Wednesday-Saturday).
