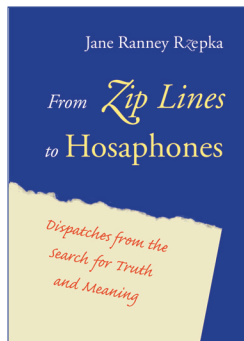


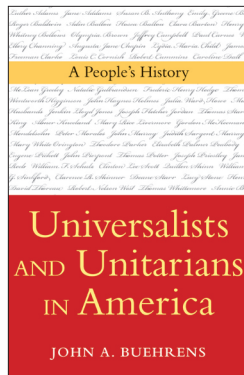
Use Skinner House Books in Church!

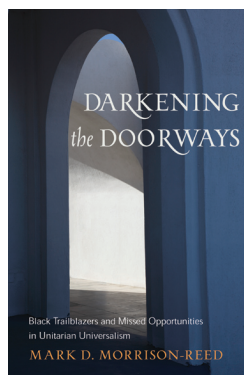
From Zip Lines to Hosaphones by Jane Rzepka

It is ideal for New Member classes or as a gift for youth who are coming of age. It could be a common text for adult RE classes or small group ministry gatherings. It also makes a great graduation or Bridging Ceremony gift for teens.



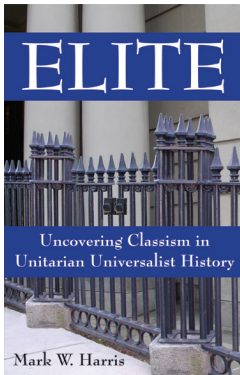
Universalists and Unitarians in America: A People's History by John Buehrens

In honor of the 50th anniversary of merger, a former UUA president offers this engaging and easily readable account of the denomination's American origins. Focusing on both the famous founders and the lesser-known figures, this history is a great candidate for your next church book group. It's also a helpful text for an adult RE class. Kept on hand, it's a convenient resource for looking up Universalists and Unitarians from the past whenever you want to honor their accomplishments.



Darkening the Doorways: Black Trailblazers and Missed Opportunities in Unitarian Universalism, edited by Mark Morrison-Reed

The foremost scholar on the history of African Americans in Unitarian Universalism collects profiles, essays and archival documents, revealing the largely untold story of black UUs in this predominantly white faith. This book can be a key part of your congregation's anti-racism, anti-oppression, multicultural programming. An important component of any study of UU history. 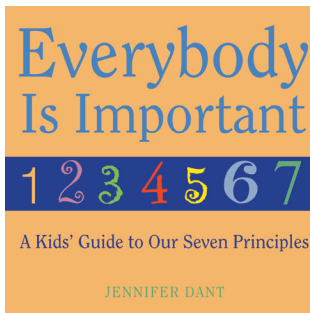
Elite: Uncovering Classism in Unitarian Universalist History by Mark Harris

UU historian Mark Harris tells the story of the privileged founders of Unitarianism and Universalism, arguing that this history needs to be known for the denomination to grow into a more inclusive future. As another part of the untold story of the faith, classism is brought out of the closet for us to face together. This can be done in book discussion groups, adult RE classes and other congregational gatherings—and can be preached about as well. Discussion guide available online.



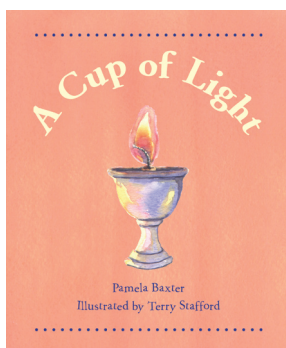
Coming Out in Faith: Voices of LGBTQ Unitarian Universalists, edited by Susan Gore and Keith Kron

A collection of testimonials about the lived experience of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender UUs of all ages. Celebrating and raising awareness about LGBTQ folks in the pews, this engaging and readable resource can be a key part of a congregation's anti-oppression programming. It makes a useful supplement to any church going through the Welcoming Congregation process—or those wanting to reinforce their commitment to LGBTQ issues.



Everybody Is Important: A Kids' Guide to Our Seven Principles by Jennifer Dant

A colorful book to help five- to seven-year-olds talk and learn about the seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism. It features two stories for each Principle and age-appropriate questions to guide the discussion. At \$6 per book, it's priced so that congregations can provide all children in the RE classroom with their own copies.



A Cup of Light: All About the Flaming Chalice by Pamela Baxter

Religious educators now have another resource to use when teaching elementary-school-aged children about the flaming chalice, the symbol of Unitarian Universalism. Fully illustrated, the book explores some of the meanings of the symbol and its importance in UU worship and practice. At \$5, it's priced so that congregations can provide all children in the RE classroom with their own copies.
