Living Legacy Pilgrimage:

On October 6, 2012, forty-four people gathered in Birmingham, Alabama, to embark on a spiritual journey led by the **Rev. Gordon Gibson** and his wife **Judy Gibson**. This week-long civil rights pilgrimage is a voyage through Mississippi and Alabama to meet Movement veterans and learn first hand of their courage and determination. It seeks to ensure that the stories of the Civil Rights Movement will not be forgotten when the veterans of the Movement are no longer with us.

The Living Legacy Project, and its primary venture, the Living Legacy Pilgrimage, grew out of Gordon and Judy Gibson's passion for sharing the Civil Rights Movement story. Four years ago, **Rev. Hope Johnson**, **Janice Marie Johnson**, and **Annette Marquis** recognized the importance of both capturing this story—

and our Unitarian Universalist role in it—and of the lessons this story teaches us about the work that still needs to be done. They formed a partnership with Gordon and Judy, establishing the Living Legacy Project. Rev. James Hobart, singer/songwriter Reggie Harris, Donna Sequeira, and Peter Kandis have since joined as part of the faculty/staff.

This year, participants of the Pilgrimage met with distinguished teachers such as:

- Mrs. Sephira Shuttlesworth, wife of the late Rev. Fred Shuttlesworth, the fiery preacher who led the Birmingham civil rights movement;
 - Morris Dees, director of the Southern Poverty Law Center;
 - Hollis Watkins, civil rights activist, singer, and founder of Southern Echo, a grass-roots organization in Mississippi;
- And many other leaders, "foot-soldiers," and their loved ones who, through their direct action and sacrifice, brought justice to so many.


Participants walked in the footsteps of the Civil Rights Movement, visiting the monuments and sites that bear witness to the tragedy and triumph of the brave souls who worked tirelessly for justice. Each step of the way, they explored together how they might bring these rich lessons alive in today's struggle for justice.
