FINAL REPORT OF THE TASK FORCE ON HOMOSEXUALITY

October 10, 1969

In September 1967, a Task Force on Homosexuality was appointed by Dr. Stanley F. Tallie, Director of the National Institute of Mental Health. This group consisted of outstanding behavioral, medical, social and legal scientists. Fifteen members were appointed to serve on the Task Force. One member, Judge David Bazelon, found it necessary because of the pressure of other commitments to resign prior to the completion of the group's deliberations. Each member has had extensive research and study experience in the areas of sexuality and sexual deviation. The mandate of the Task Force was to review carefully the current state of knowledge regarding homosexuality in its mental health aspects and to make recommendations for Institute programming in this area.

This, the final report and recommendations of the Task Force, recommends the coordination of NIMH activities in the broad area of

We must organize throughout the City to produce a block vote. The fear and apathy preventing this can be overcome with positivism and hard work.

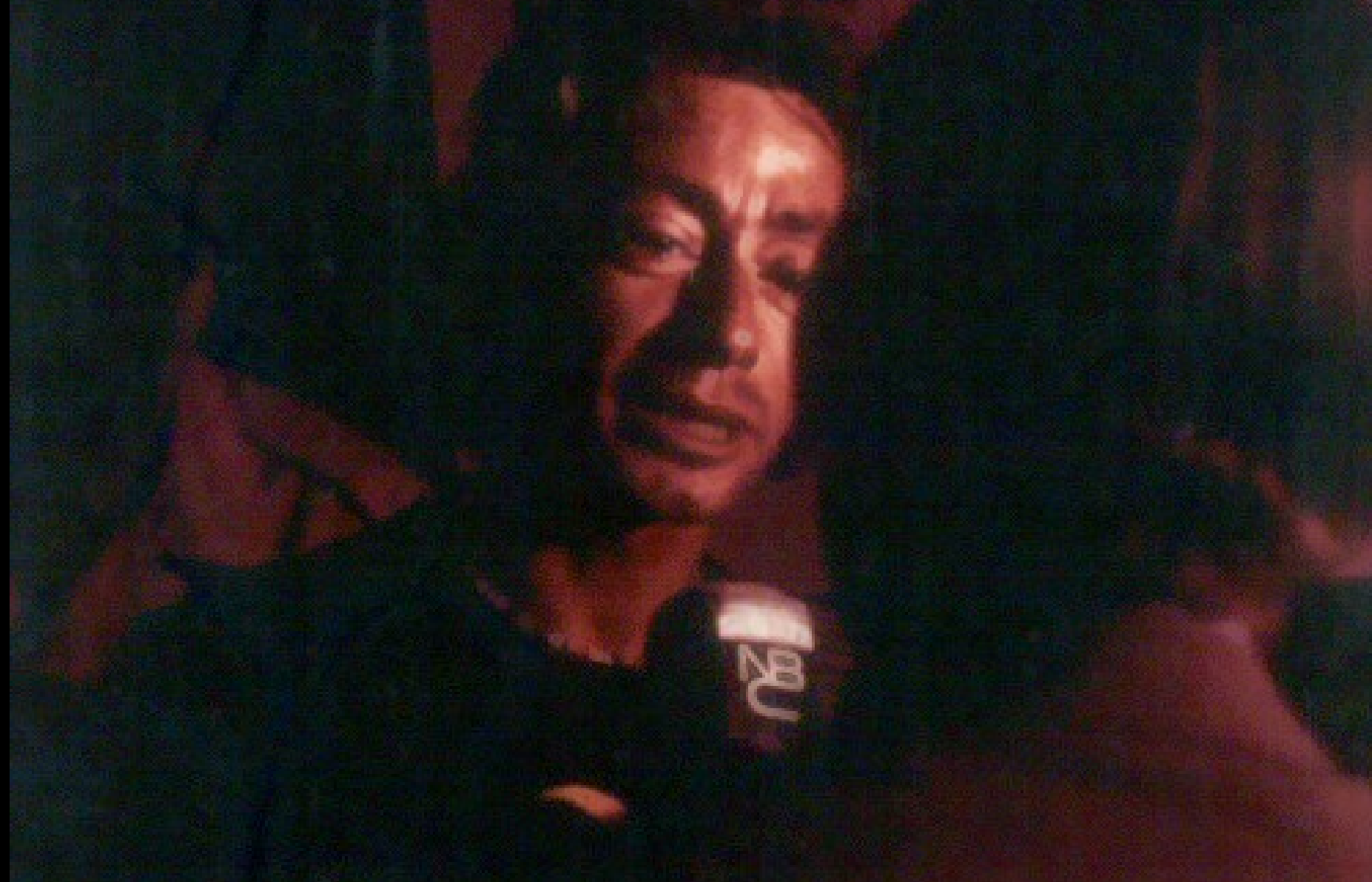
Another more concrete obstruction is going to require special tolerance and cooperation among all homosexuals.

ALBANY, N.Y.—Between 2500 and 3000 persons marched on the state Capitol in bright sunshine Sunday, Mar. 14, to demand civil rights for homosexuals. It was the second or third largest gay demonstration ever held in the United States.

"I bring you peace, love, and homosexuality from New York. We all know why we're here today," New York Gay Activists Alliance President Jim Owens told the crowd from the Capitol steps. "We're here to demand our rights from the state legislature."

People came from all over the state for the march and Capitol rally, billed as "The Gay Unveil-

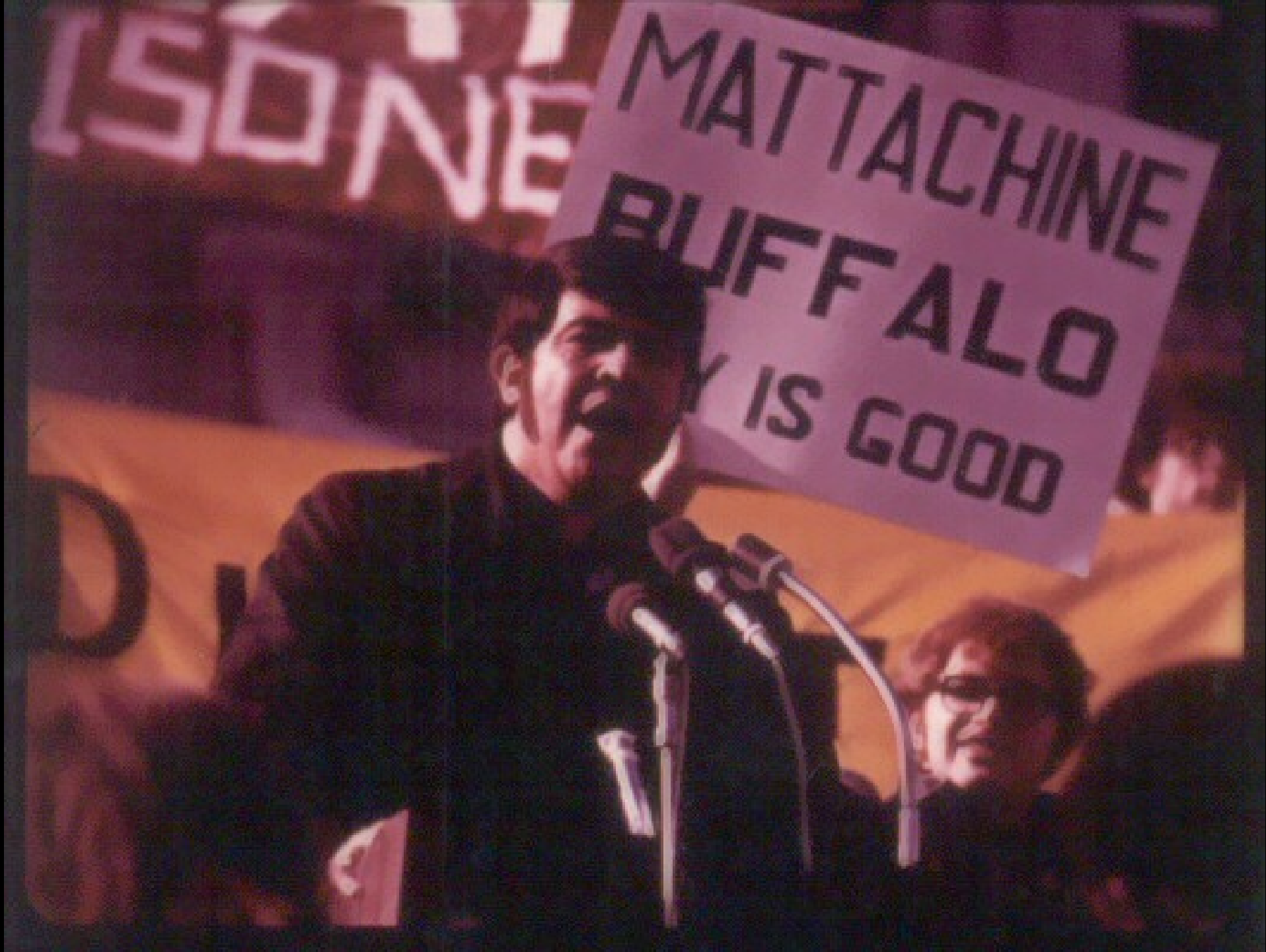

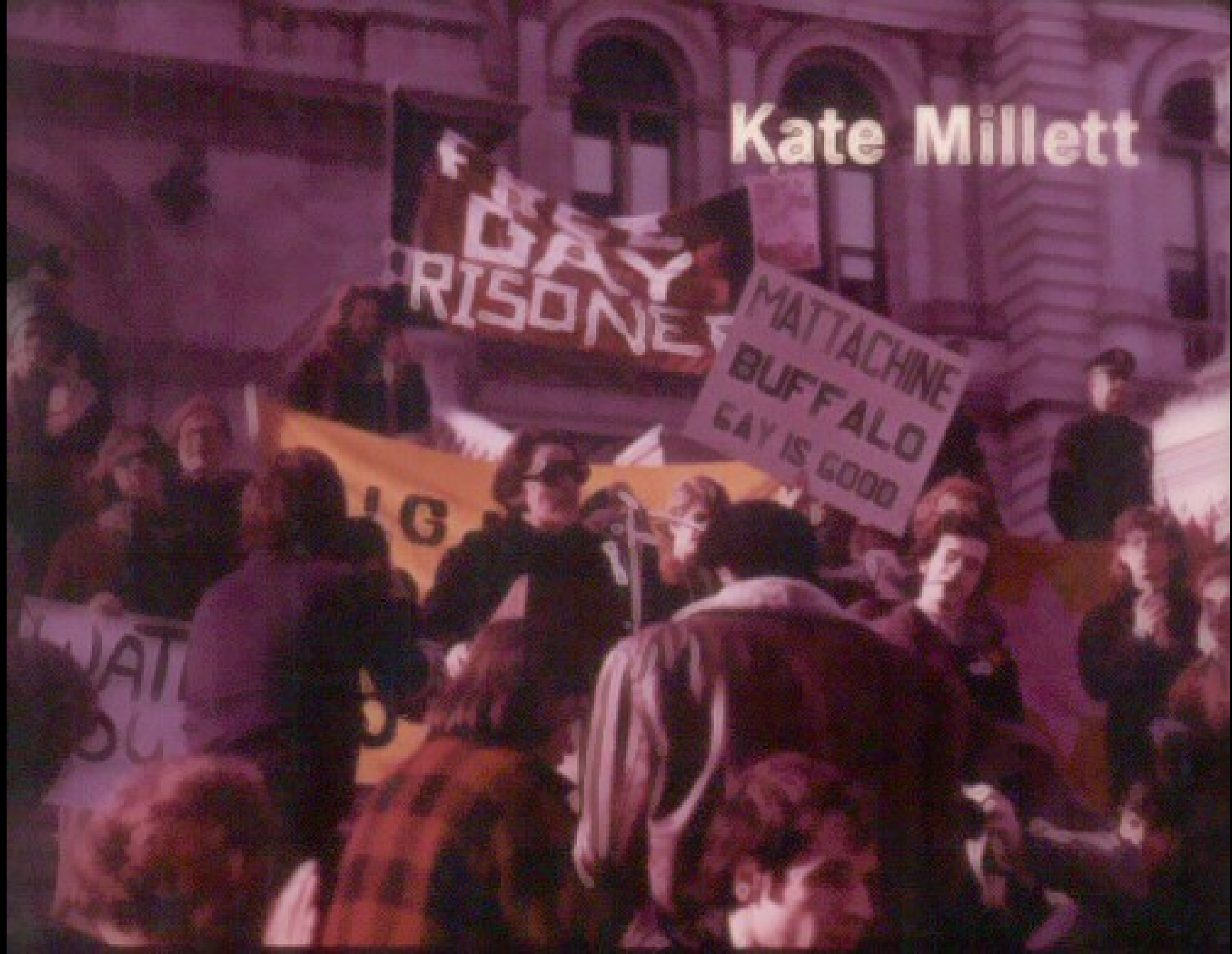
