Actions of Immediate Witness

Debate and Vote on Three Proposed Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs) – General Session V-1:15 p.m. - 3:45 p.m.

In the Sunday afternoon General Session, you'll have the opportunity to debate and vote on each of the three proposed AIWs added to the agenda on Saturday. All three may be adopted if each receives the required two-thirds vote.

The text of the draft AIWs is attached to this CSW Alert, with the unincorporated amendments listed and lettered in order of priority according to the level of support generated in the miniassemblies around these amendments. The three revised AIWs are:

AIW-A: Build Solidarity With Our Muslim Neighbors

AIW-B: Some Guns, All Guns: Legislating Appropriate Restrictions

AIW-F: Stop The Hate: Protect and Support our Transgender and Gender Non-

Proposed 2016 Action of Immediate Witness A:

Build Solidarity with our Muslims Neighbors

BECAUSE Unitarian Universalist Association's Principles call us as member congregations to affirm and promote "The inherent worth and dignity of every person" and "The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all";

WHEREAS our living tradition draws from many sources, including "Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life" and "Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves";

WHEREAS the United States Constitution is founded in part on the freedom of religious belief and practice;

WHEREAS the vast majority of American Muslims are peaceful and denounce terrorism and
 violence;

WHEREAS the histories of Unitarianism, Universalism, and Unitarian Universalism affirm the importance and centrality of freedom of religious belief and practice in this country;

WHEREAS Muslims <u>and others perceived as Muslims</u> in the United States have faced increased levels of discrimination and hate crimes since 9/11;

WHEREAS an additional layer of fear, prejudice and xenophobia have arisen following the Paris and San Bernardino terrorist attacks in 2015 and the Belgium and Orlando attacks in 2016; and some politicians have been calling for a ban on immigration and increased (unnecessary) surveillance for all Muslims following these events;

WHEREAS the refugee crisis in Syria has become a target of this fear, prejudice and xenophobia;

- WHEREAS Muslim leaders in the Detroit area and elsewhere have reached out to Unitarian
- 32 Universalists asking for our partnership to combat Islamophobia, and subsequently the
- 33 MidAmerica Regional Assembly overwhelmingly voted at its Regional Assembly to ask
- 34 <u>MidAmerica congregations to support these actions</u>; <u>and congregations have responded with</u> support;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 2016 General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association expresses its love, respect and support for Muslims in our communities and encourages its member congregations to:

• build bridges of partnership with Muslim neighbors in our local areas;

• increase understanding of Islam within and beyond our local congregations <u>especially</u> in this political moment;

Proposed 2016 Action of Immediate Witness B:

Some Guns, All Guns: Legislating Appropriate Restrictions

As the United States continues a national discussion on ending gun violence, tragedy continues.

- 4 The recent attack at the Pulse nightclub, taking the lives of 49 people and injuring 53 more,
- highlights an epidemic that claims 89 lives a day across the nation. While some aspects of gun

6 violence are complex and systemic, there is immediate action that we can take.

We can ensure responsible gun ownership with laws that keep **some guns** out of the hands of all people, and **all guns** out of the hands of some people.

- First, we call upon state and federal legislators to make it a crime for civilians to knowingly
- import, sell, manufacture, retrofit or transfer, or possess a semiautomatic assault weapon or large
- capacity ammunition feeding device. There is simply no reason for private citizens to have
- access to weapons like the MCX Carbine firearm used to murder the 49 people in the Pulse
- Night Club in Orlando on June 12, 2016. These weapons are military weapons, have immense
- destructive power and do not belong in civilian hands. Specifically, we call on legislators to
- follow the lead of the seven states California, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Hawaii, Maryland,
- New Jersey and New York that already ban assault weapons and to join those seven states plus
- 19 <u>Colorado</u> In addition, join the eight states California, Colorado, Connecticut, Hawaii,
- 20 Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York, that already prohibit in prohibiting large capacity ammunition feeding devices that hold over 10 rounds.

Second, we call upon the states and the federal government to implement comprehensive, universal background checks. Legal access to guns is still too easy – and this recent tragedy is only the latest in a long line of examples. In particular, the states should <u>enable and</u> require all <u>private</u> parties (those who are not federal or state licensed dealers (<u>private</u> or licensed) to conduct a background check before selling any firearm. Simultaneously, the state of Florida <u>all states</u> that do not currently do so should ensure that all relevant records are provided to the FBI's National Instant Criminal Background Check (NICS).

Policies such as expanding background checks to cover all gun sales would help keep guns out of the hands of criminals, felons, domestic abusers, and <u>others already deemed</u> illegal purchasers. Background checks are supported by 90 percent of Americans, including the vast majority of gun owners, because they make us all safer. Since 1994, the Brady law has blocked over 2.4 million purchases.

These regulations will not finish the task of building the world we dream of, but they will keep innumerable people safe as we continue to address broader issues of hate rhetoric, cultural violence, suicide and access to mental health care.

c. Line 9 – Insert "The US Constitution states in article 2 'a well- regulated militia being necessary'; we suggest documentation as to which militia the buyer belongs".

[awkward phrasing]

d. Line 27 – add "and ban gun ownership from anyone on the no fly list of having a history of mental illness as diagnosed by a credentialed medical professional"

[concerns about justice issues with this language]

e. Line 11 – Replace the words "for civilians" with "any person or entity" and add on Line 18 "for any purpose other than military or law enforcement"

[overly wordy]

f. Line 13 - add "and work to clarify the definition of assault weapon" [relevance is unclear]

g. Line 16 – replace "in civilian hands" with "in our communities" [vague]

h. Line 36 – add "whereas strict laws which are not enforced are virtually worthless" [Superfluous]

i. After final paragraph – "be it resolved that the laws pertaining to purchase of guns must be strictly and timely enforced"

[Superfluous]

j. Line 1 – replace title with "Require Background screening for all gun sales and ban sales of semi-automatic assault weapons"

[too wordy]

Proposed 2016 Action of Immediate Witness F:

Stop The Hate: Protect and Support our Transgender and Gender Non Conforming Family Brothers and Sisters

Non-Conforming Family Brothers and Sisters

- 4 BECAUSE "Injustice at Every Turn," a 2011 nationwide survey of transgender and gender
- 5 non-conforming people, detailed overwhelming discrimination across multiple major areas of
- 6 their lives: education, employment, health, family life, housing, and public accommodations;
- 7 BECAUSE Equality in all these areas is a fundamental human right;
- 8 BECAUSE Transgender and gender non-conforming people are routinely mistreated while in
- 9 law enforcement custody;

- 10 BECAUSE Transgender and gender non-conforming people often have great difficulty in
- obtaining face obstruction, harassment, and abuse in attempting to obtain identity documents in
- their preferred true gender. This serves to increase the social isolation transgender and gender
- 13 non-conforming people experience and diminishes their ability to participate fully in society;
- 14 BECAUSE Transgender and gender non-conforming people are often frequently isolated
- socially as a result of hate and discrimination, which leads to a general lack of understanding in
- our society concerning transgender and gender non-conforming people;
- 17 BECAUSE This leads to transgender and gender non-conforming persons being at substantially
- increased risk of violent attack:
- 19 BECAUSE All of the discrimination, poor treatment harassment and increased risk of physical,
- sexual and psychological violence that transgender and gender non-conforming people suffer
- 21 contribute to a shockingly high rate of attempted suicide a rate ten times higher than the
- average for the general population; and
- 23 WHEREAS It is in keeping with our First Principle The inherent worth and dignity of every
- person; our Second Principle Justice, equity and compassion in human relations; and our Sixth
- 25 Principle The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all; and our Seventh
- 26 Principle Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part, and
- 27 WHEREAS The following actions are immediately needed to improve the life situations and
- 28 safety of transgender and gender non-conforming persons
- 29 BE IT RESOLVED We, the Delegates of the 2016 UUA General Assembly call on Unitarian
- 30 Universalists to:
- 1. Strongly condemn the anti-transgender legislation recently passed in North Carolina,
- known as HB-2, in Tennessee as HB-1840, and Mississippi as HB-1523, and call for their
- immediate and full repeal;
- 2. Make a strong statement against the passage of any further bills targeting transgender and
- gender non-conforming persons in other states where they are pending;

- 3. Support passage of The Fairness Act (which provides protection based on gender identity and sexual orientation) and similar federal anti-discrimination legislation so that transgender and gender non-conforming persons might have their ability to fully participate in society affirmed and protected;
 - 4. Pledge to educate health care professionals and law enforcement officers about transgender and gender non-conforming people's needs;
 - 5. Pledge to educate legislators and other government officials about the need for transgender and gender non-conforming people's needs for proper identification documents; and
 - 6. Pledge to educate employers, <u>agencies</u>, <u>and institutions</u> about the needs of transgender <u>and gender non-conforming people who might be employees</u>, <u>students</u>, <u>clients and customers</u>, and <u>encourage</u> these <u>companies employers</u>, <u>agencies and institutions</u> to adopt <u>transgender friendly</u> affirming policies.

Typically, this will prohibit discrimination in employments, public accommodations, education, credit or lending, and housing; create a private right of action for aggrieved individuals and provide for enforcement through a government agency."

e. Line 13 – insert "allowing them to be affirmed and protected" [cumbersome language]
