Preparation

TIME	CONTENT
TIME Several days in advance	Assemble Materials Altar-like materials Chalice and matches Materials per participant (plan for a few extra participants): *Community Conversation Participant Guides Five post-it notes One dark Sharpie-style marker Nametag Pencil or pen Three sticky dots in three colors (green, blue, red) for voting Hymnals or words for Gathered Here (for example, hymn #389 in Singing the Living Tradition) Materials for each small group of 6 or 8: One flip chart easel and pad. Top page labeled: "Reflect on all these stories. What were we this congregation, or another UU community – doing right? What led to our success?" Next page labeled: "Strengths from the Past" 3 flip chart markers

Facilitation (2 hours)

TIME	CONTENT
5 minutes	Welcome, opening and chalice lighting
	Begin singing "Gathered Here" until people are seated.
	Read statement from UUA President, The Rev. Peter Morales:
	"Our dreams, our visions of what we seek to become, are the true
	foundation of our faith. Our dreams and our commitment to make
	them come true are what binds us together. Our faith is not about a
	fixed set of beliefs, our faith is about being faithful. The essence of
	our faith is faithfulness to one another, faithfulness to what we hold sacred in life and faithfulness to our shared dreams. Our shared
	dreams, then, are central and essential. We are our dreams.
	Without them we are nothing.
	What are our dreams today? What are we Unitarian Universalists willing to dream together? What dream will inspire us, unite us, motivate us, channel all our passion and give our life wings? What
	must we do to make our dreams come true?
	Let us dare to dream ambitious, yet possible dreams. And then let us commit ourselves to making our dreams come true."
	Go around the circle – everyone says their name.
	 Review purpose, agenda and timing.
30 minutes	Conduct interviews
	 Pass out Community Conversation Participant Guide. Explain the process.
	 Partners conduct two-way interviews, 10 minutes each, two
	questions each.
40 minutes	Share and reflect on stories
	• Instruct partners to:
	o Form groups of 6 to 8 participants.
	o Share only the highlights of their partner's story (20 minutes)
	 Appoint a scribe for this new group. Ask the group to discuss the following question on their flip
	chart pad: "Reflect on all these stories. What were we – this congregation, or another UU community – doing right? What
	led to our success?"
	 Scribe records responses on the flip chart page titled "Strengths from the Past" (20 minutes)

5 minutes	Bring stories to larger groups
3 minutes	Combine small groups into one or more large(r) groups.
	 Each group shares a single highlight from their group discussion.
	Each group shares a shigle highlight from their group discussion.
30 minutes	Envision the future
	 Reflect individually on this question (3 minutes): "What did the stories we just shared inspire you to imagine for the future of our faith – locally, regionally and nationally?" During reflection time: Pass out post-it notes, Sharpie markers and dots. Instruct participants to record their most inspired responses to the above question on post-it notes:
	cluster them. • By sticking colored dots to the post it notes, individual participants
	vote for their top three:
	 Priorities for their congregation or community (Green dots) Priorities for their local UU cluster or district (Blue dots) Priorities for the UUA (Red dots)
10 minutes	Closing reflections
10 1111101000	Remind participants that their input will help inform future
	decisions about their community. Thank them for their time.
	To end this time together, ask participants to call out answers to, "What do you love about being a Unitarian Universalist?"
