We were recently delighted to attend the **Multicultural Growth Consultation**, where ministers from congregations deeply engaged in multicultural work, district staff, and national UUA staff gathered at the Conference Center at the Maritime Institute in Baltimore, MD on March 14–15, 2011. Using an appreciative inquiry process, participants worked together to delve into and explore their best practices. This meeting came after several months of preparation by participating congregations, including rich cross-congregational conversations about vision, future action, and priorities. It was a deeply meaningful gathering that produced many insights and energized all those who attended.

Amanda Trosten-Bloom, Managing Director of the Corporation for Positive Change and a member of Jefferson Unitarian Church in Golden, CO, served as facilitator and shepherd of the process; Rev.
