Films on Immigration

Film offers one way of opening a discussion on immigration justice issues in your congregation. Consider holding a movie and discussion night with your youth group, organizing an event for a winter evening, or suggesting that small groups of congregants view films together in their homes with follow-up discussion time.

The Multicultural Growth and Witness Staff Group has prepared an [immigration film list](#) to help you get started. You will find suggestions for a couple of award-winning dramatic films, which tell compelling stories while showcasing some of the situations and conditions faced by undocumented immigrants from Central America. You will also find an extensive annotated list of documentaries, each turning the camera's eye to a particular piece of our nation's immigration story. Farm workers on Long Island, sweat shop workers in California, high school youth who face an uncertain future without papers, a Polish couple from Chicago, and Cambodian workers from Seattle are just some of the documentary subjects.
