Dear Envoys,

I've never been much of one for New Year's resolutions. Too often they felt like promises I knew I wouldn't keep. But a few years ago I heard about the practice of picking a Word of the Year: a theme or value that you hope can anchor the year ahead. I like the simultaneous simplicity and depth that one single word can bring, and how a particular year can feel all the more personal for having had a name—not just a number.

2020 was the first year I chose a word, and it was Gratitude. What a perfect word it turned out to be. Amidst *everything* that was going on, how good it felt to remind myself of everything I was thankful for.

In 2021 I chose Imperfection. This theme felt important for me to embrace, as someone who struggles with such symptoms of white supremacy culture as Perfectionism, One Right Way, and Only I Can Fix It. I tried to accept (not scorn) the messiness of life, to nurture what felt vibrant and true—and to do so in community, even when it seemed easier to disconnect.

As my year of Imperfection draws to a close, here's what I'm thinking about: It's clear that so many of our systems were broken long before the pandemic laid them bare, but simply knowing that fact won't help anything. When I look back on these years—with the looming terrors of climate change and authoritarianism—how will I wish I'd spent my time?

From Imperfection, I could turn to Comfort or Acceptance: focus only on what brings me joy and do my best to ignore my fears. But that's not what I really need right now, and it's definitely not how to reciprocate all that I'm grateful for. What I need now is **Courage**. Courage to face my fears, to fight for what I love. To show up. To engage in direct action. To organize. I need courage to accept that it won't be perfect—that I might feel foolish or afraid—but that this is worth it. A safe and habitable planet is worth it, worth everything, not least worth showing up for.

I hope that this holiday season you can celebrate lots of reasons to be grateful, and that you can experience some of this imperfect life's immeasurable beauty. And in 2022 I hope that you'll join us, courageously, in fighting for change.





Human rights - After one of the busiest years in the history of the Human Rights Council, the UN forum remains more relevant than ever. Of particular note is its [action on COVID-19 vaccine inequity and climate change](#). Speaking as she prepares to step down from her one-year term as President of the Council at the end of the month, Ambassador Nashat Shameem Khan also looked ahead to her new role at the International Criminal Court (ICC), where her appointment as Deputy Prosecutor was announced recently.

Pandemic - Arguing that the world "cannot defeat a pandemic in an uncoordinated way," the UN Secretary-General said that countries "must take concrete action in the coming days" to vaccinate 40 per cent of the world's population by the end of the year. "Vaccine inequity is giving variants a free pass to run wild - ravaging the health of people and economies in every corner of the globe," António Guterres said. "It is becoming clear that vaccines alone will not eradicate the pandemic. Vaccines are averting hospitalization and death for the majority who get them and slowing the spread. But [transmissions show no sign of letting up. This is driven by vaccine inequity, hesitancy and complacency.](#)"

Uyghur rights defender - Four UN independent human rights experts [called for Morocco to reverse its decision to extradite a Uyghur Muslim to China](#) as his return would place him under threat of serious human rights violations. If he is made to return, human rights defender

Yidiresi Aishan risks detention, enforced disappearance, or torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment, the experts argue.

Climate, conflict, displacement - A flare-up in intercommunal fighting in northern Cameroon has forced [tens of thousands of people to flee their homes and brought a halt to aid operations there](#), said the UN refugee agency, UNHCR. The development is just the latest episode in the difficult relationship between the region's herders, fishermen and farmers, who have seen the waters and tributaries of Lake Chad shrink dramatically, because of climate change-induced drought.
