

Social Justice, Empowerment and Lifespan Learning

As an advocate of UU lifespan faith development, I believe that experiencing social justice as part of the heart of congregational life helps create vital lifespan learning. Putting social justice at the heart of congregations is the core premise of the Social Justice Empowerment Workshops, a model created by Susan Leslie, the UUA's Congregational Advocacy and Witness Director, who graciously trained me in this SJE model. In the MidAmerica Region, congregations like the UU Church of Evanston, Illinois, experienced the Social Justice

Empowerment Workshop model a few years back, and then went on to do great state advocacy work. More recently, North Shore Unitarian, in Deerfield, Illinois, took part in an SJE workshop that I was thrilled to co-lead with Rev. Scott Aaseng, the new Director of the UU Advocacy Network of Illinois (UUANI).

Third International Women's Convocation

The Third International Women's Convocation will bring together
Unitarian and Universalist women from around the world to connect,
share, celebrate, and empower in the beautiful, inspirational setting of
Asilomar, "a refuge by the sea."The Convocation is being held February
16-19, 2017 at Asilomar Conference Center, Monterey Peninsula, California.



The Convocation theme is Weaving a Global Partnership: Forging a Just Future Together. This Convocation is a rare opportunity for MidAmerica women and transgender leaders to network with UU women and transgender persons from around the world. The connections you make at this Convocation will help strengthen your personal connection to the wider UU movement, and bring a perspective to your congregation's programming. I had the privilege of serving as staff for the First International Women's Convocation in 2009, and found it to be a life-changing experience. The Convocation will focus on issues of concern to women and transgender persons. Participants will focus on one of several tracks: leadership development, education, health and reproductive justice, preventing violence, or economic empowerment. Priorities and action steps in each of these areas will be set using a community capacity building process. This process can also be used within congregations, and in working with congregational community partners.

Our keynote speaker will be Rev. Dr. Rosemary Bray McNatt, President of Starr King School for the Ministry. Other keynote speakers include Dr. Cecilia Conrad of the MacArthur Foundation, UU minister and Soto Zen priest Rev. Florence Caplow, Bolivian human rights activist Olga Flores, Philippine women's rights activist Cecilia Hoffmann, and Gizella Nagy, who created a Leadership School for Transylvanian Unitarian women. We are also pleased that all three candidates for UUA President will attend.

Registration is \$350. Bring one or more friends from your church and you qualify for a group discount of \$50 off each. An additional \$50 discount is available for UU ministers. Standing Rock Resistance

The MidAmerica Region of the UUA is receiving donations to support small travel stipends for those able and willing to travel to North Dakota in solidarity with the Standing Rock resistance. **DONATE NOW.**

The Bismarck-Mandan UU Fellowship and Church is supporting the protesters of the Dakota Access Pipeline that is proposed to go under the Missouri River just a



few miles away from Standing Rock Nation. If you've been following the news on the Dakota Access Pipeline, you are aware of The Sacred Stone Camp near Standing Rock. A group of citizens led by Native Americans is protesting the Dakota Access oil pipeline, which is routed to cross the Missouri River just north of Standing Rock Reservation. All pipelines eventually leak as they age and thus will contaminate the water of the Missouri River.

Hundreds of people are coming from all over the country to express their concerns with the pipeline. This pipeline was originally proposed to cross the Missouri River a few miles north of Bismarck, North Dakota but was nixed because of possible water contamination.
