

### Announcing the 2025-2026 UU Common Read


The 2025–2026 UU Common Read is <u>Social Change Now: A Guide for Reflection and Connection</u> by Deepa Iyer. The Common Read builds community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared platform for reflection and a shared focus for action. This year's selection invites Unitarian Universalists to become more authentic, connected, and effective as individuals and communities as we pursue transformative justice together.

Social Change Now seeks to initiate or deepen the actions of individuals and groups in service to social change values. Relying on two decades of work supporting social movements, Iyer introduces the social change ecosystem framework, which includes a map of ten roles, from builder to storyteller to disrupter to experimenter, as well as practices to identify values and strengthen our social change ecosystems. It goes well beyond presenting ideas and frameworks and is also a practical guide that contains descriptions and many real-world examples,

reflection prompts with room to write responses, and accessible tips that can immediately be put into action. It is a resource that will accompany individuals and organizations not only in times of crisis, but throughout their lifelong social change journeys to build connected communities and equitable systems in our world. There is also a <u>corresponding poster</u> of the ecosystem map!

An introduction and resource kit are now available. This UU Common Read offers two discussion tracks to engage across the lifespan. The track for adults, adaptable to include older youth, offers three sessions of reflection, discussion, and groupwork in a small group format. The other track is multigenerational, incorporating Iyer's new children's book, *We Are the Builders!*, into three sessions for children and families to experience learning synergy together. 





#### Peter Mayer Profiled by Religion News Service



The profile details Mayer's long career and the enduring love for his work and the song "Blue Boat Home" in particular. The beloved song was recently adapted into a children's book illustrated by Sue Todd and published by Skinner House.

"Blue Boat Home,' a popular hymn in Unitarian Universalist circles that pairs with the well-known tune 'Hyfrydol'—also used in hymns like Charles Wesley's 'Come Thou

Long Expected Jesus'—showcases Mayer's sense of wonder about the universe. The song, often sung by choirs and church congregations, has been covered by classical and folk singers alike."

The children's book follows an adult and child reverently experiencing a beautiful day together in their community, both appreciating the here and now and looking outward and upward to the vast transcendent glory of the universe. With musician Peter Mayer's striking and poetic lyrics and imaginative illustrations by artist Sue Todd, *Blue Boat Home* will foster wonder and care for our natural world in young readers and adults alike. 
