

OPPORTUNITIES: NEEDS OF THE WORSHIPING BODY

- Vulnerability
- Mind body spirit wholeness
- Transformation
- Countering isolation and alienation
- Longing to feel connected to a larger story
- Feeling empowered and fortified
- Have gifts witnessed and affirmed
- Hope
- Connecting to one another in a regulated space
- Embodied practice and rituals
- Authenticity

ROADBLOCKS

- Capitalist mindset
- Hyper individualism
- Lack of shared language and understanding
- Congregations clinging to old models and habits
- Widespread distress in the world
- The myth/lie that we "come to church to escape the world" (i.e. bunker mentality)
- Worship that doesn't engage the real world and what people bring
- Always needing to follow "the plan"

Stay tuned for a follow - up question.


In your same group, take a moment of silent reflection:

NEW GROUNDING ASSUMPTIONS

- Unitarian Universalists are spiritually hungry
- Worship Leaders are over -functioning and can't always access "the Well"
- Our task is to develop the skills to engage the Spirit so that we might be transformed

GENERATIVE QUESTIONS AS SKILLS

- What makes your idea/spark a religious or spiritual one?
- Does it engage the "big questions" that we as humans wrestle with?
 - Which Big Question(s) and how?
- How does your idea/spark inform the way that we understand, engage, and strengthen our relationship to That Which Is Larger Than Us?

GENERATIVE QUESTIONS AS SKILLS

- What transformation, for you or for others, is possible in exploring your idea?
- How could your spark/nugget embody hope?
- How could it invite people into new engagement with others, with the world around them, and/or with That Which Is Larger Than Us?
- Is there a way to embody your intention, or express it through ritual?


In groups of 4 -5, reflection in these invitations for 20 minutes:


