
Responsive to Congregational Finances

APF is the UUA's largest source of unrestricted giving



#### **Covenant**

APF giving embodies the covenant that binds congregations to each other and the UUA

### **APF Performance in FY25**

- APF brought in \$8.8 million, up \$110K from FY24
- Attainment was 66%, down 1% from FY24
- Pacific Western Region (PWR) had the highest giving at \$2 million, the highest attainment, at 73%, and the most Honor Congregations, 111. PWR also had the steepest drop in giving from FY24.
- 409 Congregations increased their giving, adding \$675K to the total raised.
- **373 Congregations decreased** their giving, reducing the total raised by \$565K.Of the congregations that contributed less in FY25, 222 were Honor.
- Wave Cohort Participants report congregational finances, pandemic impacts, perceived value of the UUA, relational distance, and equity concerns about APF participation as factors that impact their level of giving.
