# What is risk?

**Risk:** The potential negative consequences of an action, inaction or occurrence. *Risks are things that make it harder for you to fulfill your mission.*

Risks may include: financial loss or hardship; legal consequences; internal or external conflict; organizational disruption; damage to reputation; physical damage or violence toward people or property; digital security breaches; or spiritual, emotional, or psychological harm.



# Theological Anchors

- **Interdependence** – our actions influence one another, and can create risks for one another
- **Justice & Equity** – risks are not evenly distributed
- **Courage & Humility** – risk is a spectrum, not a binary; there's no such thing as perfect safety
- **Generosity** – prepares us to buffer financial risks
- **Faithfulness** – move through risk towards faithful calling
- **Universalism** – no one is disposable, each holds a spark of the divine to protect; safety and salvation is collective



***We seek to lower the risks we don't need,  
so we are ready to take the risks that our  
faith calls us towards.***

## Wave Cohort Description

- Four virtual sessions September - December
- 30+ congregations participated
- Explored the "enterprise risk management" model
- Tested tools for congregational risk management planning
- Identified key risk areas for congregations



# Wave Cohort Insights

Top risk scenarios participants were concerned about

- Building damage/vandalism
- Cybersecurity
- Intrusions/Sunday services interruptions
- Finances (rising costs)

Other areas: emotional/spiritual fatigue, membership decline, government targeting, doxing, active shooters/physical violence

**Assessment – thinking through  
the impacts (clarifying)**

*Adapted from organizational

# CURRENT RISK LANDSCAPE – POLITICAL & SOCIAL ISSUES FOR CONGREGATIONS



## Trends

- Repressive immigration regime with “surges,” troop deployments for targeted cities
- Federal government using funding to target civil society
- Travel risks for non-citizens, transgender people
- SCOTUS supports expansion of executive authority, but also protects free exercise of religion
- Right wing activation: white supremacist, anti-immigrant, anti-trans and anti-abortion
- Rising random violence and mass shootings
- Rampant misinformation, confusion of facts vs AI



## Trends

- Historically high levels of protest activity (pro-Palestine, No Kings, anti-ICE/NG)
- Resurgence in mutual aid networks
- People getting activated to counter rising fascism
- More interest and attendance in congregations
- Increased interfaith, cross-sector cooperation

<b>Scenario</b>	<b>Description</b>
<b>Right-wing protest</b>	Right-wing or conservative groups protest at the congregation's building or event
<b>Arson/Vandalism</b>	The congregation's building or grounds are targeted and deliberately damaged
<b>Legal status challenged</b>	A state or federal agency targets the congregation for investigation or subpoena, for political reasons – nonprofit status, employment violations, "child abuse" for GAC, or a "terrorism" designation
<b>Immigration Raid</b>	Federal agents enter a church building for a raid or immigration enforcement action
<b>National Guard Deployment</b>	National Guard, likely with ICE/CBP, are deployed to the city/metro where the congregation is located
<b>Disruptive Person</b>	Person enters the church, esp. a Sunday service, with the goal of non-violent disruption; may or may not be experiencing mental health crisis
<b>Violent In-Person Attack</b>	Person enters the church, esp. a Sunday service, with the goal of physically harming people
<b>Social Media Attack</b>	High-profile condemnation of a congregation or leader on social media, leading to a deluge of attacks



# Congregational Incidents (since 2023)

Based on UUA reporting systems:

- Right-wing protests
- Vandalism
- Threats
- Disruptive Person
- Menacing/Harassment

Common flashpoints – OWL, Black Lives Matter/Rainbow flags, trans ministers, drag queen story hour

Scenario	Mitigation Strategies for congregation	Mitigated Risk?
<b>Right-wing protest</b>	Local support for non-violent de-escalation, support for PR and media attention	Medium
<b>Arson/Vandalism</b>	Property Insurance, security systems	Low
<b>Legal status challenged</b>	General Liability Insurance, updated HR practices, public faith profile, support from UUA	Unknown
<b>Immigration Raid</b>	Clarify public space; risk depends on connections/presence to immigrant communities	Unknown
<b>National Guard Deployment</b>	Community-level planning; risk depends on congregation's physical location	In Process
<b>Disruptive Person</b>	Security and response procedures; debrief	Low
<b>Violent In-Person Attack</b>	Emergency & evacuation protocols, monitor access; physical hardening; hire security if known threat exists	High
<b>Social Media Attack</b>	Crisis communications (with UUA support), protocols for hiding website & social accounts	High
