What Is Mosaic Makers: Leading Vital Multicultural Congregations?

Mosaic Makers is a leadership development initiative designed to equip UU leaders to minister effectively in a multicultural world, from welcome to worship, membership to leadership, spirituality to social justice. Mosaic Makers is a program of the Multicultural Leadership Institute.

Mosaic focuses on four areas of ministry:

- 1. Worship worship that exhibits commitment to excellence, professionalism, authenticity, cultural integrity, and intergenerational inclusion
- 2. Congregational Culture welcome, culturally inclusive hospitality, intergenerational community, clear paths of belonging, and deep engagement
- 3. Leadership diverse, inclusive, cross-cultural, intergenerational, and ongoing learning
- 4. Justice Ministry relational, spiritually grounded, contextual, embracing of larger community, and praxis-reflection-praxis centered

Who Is Mosaic Makers For?

Mosaic Makers is designed for congregations *intentionally* on the journey toward building multicultural community. It is for leaders – professional and lay -- whose congregations have made the explicit commitment to building multicultural ministries and communities rooted in social justice. Note that multicultural ministries is not about "browning the pews;" it's about ministering in the context of a larger multicultural community – class, race/ethnicity, sexual orientation/identity, gender and gender expression, ability, and the intersections of these (social) identities.

Multicultural Ministry is not a solo act. This is not a job that the staff or volunteers can do apart from each other. Multicultural Ministry is shared ministry/team leadership. Commitment is needed from staff and lay leaders.

Background – Mosaic Makers emerged from a Multicultural Growth Consultation in 2011 involving 8 UU congregations committed to intentional multicultural ministries in dialogue with each other. Ministers of those congregations participated in a two-day meeting where they identified the guiding principles that have shaped the evolution of Mosaic Makers: including experiential learning, relationship with leaders on the same path, sustained engagement, and shared leadership – professional and lay. In addition, they identified four "pillars" essential to starting, living into, and sustaining multicultural ministries and communities: Worship, Leadership, Congregational Life (now called Congregational Culture), and Justice Ministries.

The first Mosaic Makers Conference was held in partnership with All Souls Church, Unitarian in Washington, DC in 2012 and involved 12 congregations invited because of their participation in the UUA's Diversity of Ministry Initiative and UU congregations with demonstrated commitment to building multicultural commitment to building multicultural ministry and communities.



The second Mosaic Makers Conference was held in partnership with All Souls UU Church/Tulsa, OK and attracted 120 UU leaders from 16 congregations.

Here's the programmatic lay of the land. In addition to stellar presenters, staff members of the host congregation and of MGW took on the role of faculty as teachers and mentors. The chaplain tended to the spiritual needs of the community and led a team of dedicated and caring volunteers.

Then, after the full weekend, ministers gathered for a day to continue reflecting, sharing, and learning.
