UUs in Paris for Climate Change Conference

The Unitarian Universalist United Nations Office's close ties with the United Nations provided the opportunity for the UUA to send six UU observers to the 21st Session of the Conference of the Parties (COP21) in Paris, France. The conference concluded with "[The Paris Agreement](#)," which created a consensus among 195 countries to lower carbon emissions and to mitigate climate change.

UUA representatives included Rev. Peggy Clarke, Jan Dash, Lynn Dash, Doris Marlin, Bill McPherson, and David Tucker. The UUA co-sponsored panels including "Faith, Race, and Climate Change: Advancing a Moral Lens on Climate Justice through a Social Justice Framework" and "Examination of How Nations Have and Should Consider Equity and Justice in Setting INDCs."

The Paris Agreement is a monumental achievement, but just a first step. We as people of faith and conscience have a responsibility to continue to advocate for climate justice worldwide. For more information about the conference, visit [Jan Dash's blog](#) and the [Commit2Respond blog](#).



Her contribution to American history—and courageous role in the African American struggle for justice and freedom for more than a half century—far surpasses her act of defiance on a Montgomery bus. Based on years of archival research and interviews, this book gives Mrs. Parks her due as a lifelong freedom fighter. *The Rebellious Life of Mrs. Rosa Parks* is now available at the UUA Bookstore at a 15% discount using the code **RPJan16**.
