New Resource: Doctrine of Discovery

Many of the injustices faced by indigenous peoples in America are rooted in the Doctrine of Discovery, which legalized and promoted the conquest, colonization, and exploitation of non-Christian territories by European settlers. Now, [a new resource on UUA.org](#) allows truth-seekers to learn about the history and ongoing effects of the Doctrine on Native American communities, as well as ways to move toward healing and reconciliation with indigenous communities.



Funded by a gift from a generous donor, the webpages are a resource where visitors can learn about the cultural, educational, and economic challenges still facing Native American tribes, as well as how the UUA and other faith denominations have repudiated the doctrine. Read stories of how some UU congregations have taken action to understand, honor, and build respectful relationships with indigenous people and organizations.

Donor Feature: Les Solomon

“I wanted to live with integrity,” said Les Solomon about his decision to become a Unitarian Universalist ten years ago. An active member of the Williamsburg Unitarians in Williamsburg, Virginia, Les has served as President and led the development of a \$2.5 million building extension. His integrity and commitment to social justice inspired his generous gift to fund the new Doctrine of Discovery pages on UUA.org. The Doctrine, which created a legal basis for the conquest, colonization, and exploitation of non-Christian territories and peoples, was condemned by the UUA at the 2012 General Assembly.



For many years the Solomon family grew hay and grazed Texas Longhorn cattle on their 640-acre section in Kansas, “a beautiful piece of rolling grassland that has never seen the plow.” In 2011, as the family realized it was time to sell the ranch, Les found himself feeling “a sense of responsibility to give back

to the American Indians” who had called the land home. When he learned about the Doctrine of Discovery at the 2012 UUA General Assembly in Phoenix, he realized he could make a difference by increasing awareness of Native American issues and history within the UU community.

A Native American proverb says “Treat the earth well: it was not given to you by your parents, it was loaned to you by your children.” Through his gift to the UUA, the Solomon family’s land is helping to educate the public on the history and current issues facing its original inhabitants.

Amplifying UU Voices through Podcasting

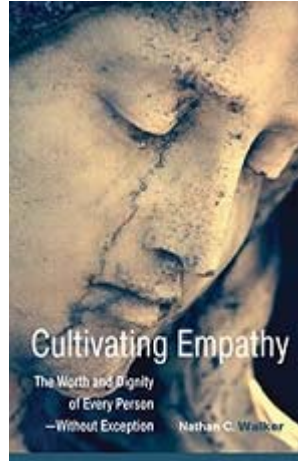
