


A holistic sexuality education program for older adults that models and fosters caring, compassion, respect, and justice. It balances knowledge-building with exploration of attitudes, values, and feelings about one's own and others' sexuality. This program is comprehensive and progressive, addressing sexuality with candor, sensitivity, and respect for older adults' wisdom and life experience.

Our Whole Lives, Older Adults addresses

#### Discussion Guide for the 2019-2020 Common Read

A Common Read invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. It can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations. The Common Read Selection Committee has chosen <a href="#">An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States</a> by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz and the corresponding edition for youth, <a href="#">An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States</a> for Young People, adapted by Jean Mendoza and Debbie Reese, as the new Common Read. Both are published by Beacon Press.

The discussion guide is now <u>available</u> (in one 90-minute session, or a 3-session series) and it will work for readers of either version. Find out more about the Common Read at <u>www.uua.org/books/read</u>.

In 2020, the United States will approach the 400th anniversary of the much-mythologized encounter at Plymouth between colonists and those native to the land, and our own General Assembly 2020, in Providence, RI, will speak to the truths that contradict the mythology.

At the same time, movements in response to global and local environmental emergencies, many involving UUs, are increasingly recognizing the connection between Indigenous rights and climate justice. This Common Read invites UU congregations, communities, and individuals to learn the story of trauma and resilience that is the Indigenous peoples' history of the United States.





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#### Review of After the Good News

### January's Goodreads **Book Club** Pick!

January's read is *The Stars in Our Pocket: Getting Lost and Sometimes Found in the Digital Age* by Howard Axelrod (Beacon Press). What shapes our sense of place, our sense of time, and our memory? How is technology changing the way we make sense of the world and of ourselves? Drawing on his experience of acclimating to a life of solitude in the woods and then to digital life upon his return to the city, Howard Axelrod explores the human brain's impressive but indiscriminate ability to adapt to its surroundings. As we navigate the rapid shifts between the physical and digital realms, what traits are we trading without being aware of it? *The Stars in Our Pockets* is a personal and profound reminder of the world around us and the worlds within us—and how, as alienated as we may sometimes feel, they were made for each other.
