



Goal 1: End poverty in all its forms everywhere

Goal 1 Targets:

- 1.1) By 2030, **eradicate extreme poverty** for all people everywhere, currently measured as people living on less than \$1.25 a day.
- 1.2) By 2030, **reduce at least by half the proportion** of men, women and children of all ages **living in poverty** in all its dimensions according to national definitions.
- 1.3) **Implement** nationally appropriate **social protection systems** and measures for all, including floors, and by 2030 achieve substantial coverage of the poor and the vulnerable.
- 1.4) By 2030, ensure that all men and women, in particular the poor and the vulnerable, have **equal rights to economic resources**, as well as **access to basic services, ownership and control over land** and other forms of **property**, inheritance, natural resources, appropriate new technology and financial services, including microfinance.
- 1.5) By 2030, **build the resilience of the poor** and those in vulnerable situations and **reduce their exposure and vulnerability to climate-related extreme events** and other economic, social and environmental shocks and **disasters**.
- 1.a) Ensure significant **mobilization of resources** from a variety of sources, including through enhanced development cooperation, in order to **provide adequate and predictable means for developing countries**, in particular least developed countries, to implement programmes and policies to end poverty in all its dimensions.
- 1.b) Create **sound policy frameworks** at the national, regional and international levels, based on **pro-poor and gender-sensitive development strategies**, to support accelerated investment in poverty eradication actions.

Take action toward achieving goal 1

Take action locally:

- **Congregational actions:** *Engage members of your congregation in action either through volunteering, advocacy, exercises, or wider congregational changes.*
 - **Organize a volunteer trip or hold a fundraiser of goods (ie clothing, food, supplies) or funds for your local homeless shelter.**
 - Call your local shelter first to discern their greatest needs using U.S. listings [here](#) and Canadian listings [here](#).
 - **Try a social class exercise** at your congregation with a discussion to follow to spark dialogue about economic privilege and its intersections with race, education, gender, and sexuality.
 - Try holding a [privilege circle](#) or a [privilege beads](#) exercise.
 - Try this [Class Background Inventory](#).
 - **Take on the “Escalating Inequality” Congregational Study/Action Issue** nominated in Providence, RI for GA 2014.
 - **Check out this [UUA Study Guide](#)** on working to end extreme poverty, and form a taskforce to brainstorm ways to engage your congregation in action.
 - **Check out this [list of ways](#) that classism can be prevalent in a UU setting.** How may these occur in your congregation, and what steps can you take to address them?

- **Petitions:** *Sign the following petitions advocating for a fair living wage for workers in the U.S. and Canada. Collect signatures at your congregation by book a table during coffee hour.*
 - **Advocate for legislation to raise the minimum wage** to \$10.10 per hour. Call the Senate at **(866) 204-2557** and ask them to raise the minimum wage.

Take action internationally:

 - [One Acre Fund](#): An NGO that works toward bring rural farmers out of poverty through farm supply financing, agricultural training, and harvest sale and profit maximization training.
 - [World Concern](#): An international NGO that aims to reduce poverty through education programs, microloans, and [vocational training workshops](#) in Cambodia, Bangladesh, Thailand, South Sudan, and Laos.
